

How many blades does the waterwheel have?


Take the number of blades, subtract six, and you'll have the number of letters in the name of your next stop.



STOP - 2

What living creature is part of both the birdlife and the art of Isla del Soto?

Starts with W.



WOODPECKER SOTO ISLAND



'Wenceslao' watches over you from a height of 6.5 metres. Made of iron with a copper crest, he's one of the sculptures on the *Emboscado Art Route*.

This bird uses its powerful beak to hunt for larvae beneath the wood – and your next clue is also made of wood.

NEXT

STOP - 3

Look for two tools that leave coloured marks upon paper.

They are raised high in the air, under an artificial light that shines, every night, at the entrance to the Soto.





COLOURED PENCILS FOOTBRIDGE TO THE SOTO BY LA PLAZA DE LA IGLESIA




Perched high atop a lamppost, two coloured pencils point to the east.

MURAL 'WOMAN, HISTORY AND COMMUNITY' PLAZA DE ESPAÑA




This mural pays tribute to the women of Santa Marta, who sustained local trade and community life.

Among familiar houses and shops like Bar La Esquinita, Lechería Carrero or Ferretería Chacón, a kite takes flight.



STOP







A striking close-up of a woman's face – vividly painted, hyper-realistic, and lost in the rhythm of her music – is one of the award-winning murals from the first edition of *Santa Marta's Urban Art Festival*.

NEXT









In Santa Marta, the game of billiards leaves the tables and takes to the streets.

Seven smooth and striped spheres – each the size of a basketball – pay tribute to the old "Chapulín de carambolas". Remember the number of the black ball – it's the key to your final clue!





Take the number of the black pool ball and cut it in half – that's how many stingrays you'll need to find.

In a slice of ocean captured between walls, you'll spot them in the tunnel.
